Public Messages Alcohol Awareness Month April 2023

Alcohol use is the third leading cause of preventable death in the United States. No one should die from this preventable disease. In 2006, Congress enacted the Sober Truth on Preventing Underage Drinking (STOP) Act (Public Law 109-422) to acknowledge that: a multi-faceted effort and a coordinated approach is needed. Of the 97,000,000 individuals, ages 12-20 in Alabama, in the past month 16.4% have used alcohol (2021 Report to Congress by SAMSHA). According to the Alabama Substance Abuse Block Grant Prevention Annual Report 2020-2021, Wilcox County has only one Intervention program implemented.

The legal drinking age in Alabama for consumption of an alcoholic beverage is 21. Purchasing, possessing, or consuming alcohol prior to your 21st birthday is a firstdegree misdemeanor. The maximum penalties associated with this offense are six months imprisonment or a \$1,000 fine or both.





PLANT A PINWHEEL GARDEN

Numerous organizations and community showed the Wilcox County community that they support children's healthy development with a pinwheel garden during Child Abuse Prevention Month April 10th! Pinwheel gardens represent our effort to focus on community activities that support families and public policies that prioritize prevention right from the start to make sure child abuse and neglect never occur. Pinwheels are used to help educate communities about the importance of supporting children and families. Shining in the sun, the pinwheel is reflective of the bright future all children deserve and our belief that getting it right early is less costly. His year 84 pinwheels were planted representing Wilcox County children involved in an abuse investigation last year.





A family summit is deeply, deeply important for a couple reasons. One, there's no other organizational structure that doesn't do something like this. Almost all businesses do offsites, do retreats, do quarterly summits or meetings, and then they certainly do some type of end of the year review is sometimes what they call it. Churches do this with planning out the content and the sermons and the vision from the elders. I mean, every single organizational structure has some level of marking the annual rhythm to look back, look forward.

And what is also really true about those, that also we don't do as much in our personal ones, is a lot of them spend almost just as much time looking back as they do looking forward. I think so much when we get to the personal, we just like goals, goals, goals, future, future, future. We're not like, you know, I think they do that in those, but a lot of times, even what I just said with the business, it's called an end of the year review. So that actually has nothing to do with next year. It's like you're just looking at this last year. And what that does is looking back at the last year automatically already starts kind of setting the tone for next year, if that makes sense. You almost know what you need to work on by looking at last year. You almost don't even have to have that conversation by looking at the review.

And I think reflecting is really important. In general, what would it look like to set a day or two aside, and for us, when I say a day or two, I mean, we did it in blocks, just kind of a couple hours here, back with the kids, couple hours there, where you're kind of setting aside time to ask yourself the big questions, to ask yourself what worked, what didn't work, to look at everything from the spiritual, the emotional, to the physical, and just assess, just take a stock and an assessment of how did the family do this year? Was it healthy? Were we thriving? What worked? What didn't work? How was our team? Just like any team should assess their team, and looking at all of those different things (<u>How to Lead an Annual Family Summit - Family Teams</u>).

FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLE BENEFIT CARDS AVAILABLE FOR SENIORS



MONTGOMERY, Ala. – The Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) is a federally funded program administered by the Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries' Farmers Market Authority Section. The SFMNP provides eligible seniors with a \$50 benefit card to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables from certified farmers at farmers markets and farm stands in the state of Alabama. You can apply at https://agi.alabama.gov/ or https://agi.alabama.gov/ farmers market to this release.

"The SFMNP card monetary increase from \$30 to \$50 will allow senior citizens to purchase more local products. I want to encourage those who are eligible to apply and begin shopping local!" said Commissioner of Agriculture and Industries Rick Pate. "ADAI looks forward to another year of supporting Alabama's farmers and senior citizens through the Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program."

Important Notice

The Benefit Card will replace the paper vouchers issued in the past. Seniors are encouraged to keep this card in a safe place once it is received. Benefits will be loaded to this same card each year after an application is submitted, therefore, it is especially important to keep the card.

The SFMNP provides eligible seniors with a \$50 benefit card to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables from certified farmers at farmers markets and farm stands in the state of Alabama. This program has limited funding and food benefits are available on a first come, first serve basis until available funds are committed. Seniors are encouraged to complete an application as soon as possible.

Eligibility:

- Age Must be 60 years of age or older on the day of application, AND
- Income Applicants' gross household income must not exceed these limits: \$2,096 monthly ... for a household of ... 1

\$2,823 monthly ... for a household of ... 2

Applicants must apply online at <u>https://agi.alabama.gov/farmersmarket/</u>. Unfortunately, applications cannot be taken over the phone or by mail. If you have the Benefits card from 2022, you will need your card number to renew that card and submit your application. If eligible and your application submission is completed, a benefit card will be mailed to the address provided on the application for new recipients. Applicants must reapply every year. However, it is important to keep the benefits card since new benefits will be loaded on the card each year after an application is received.
